We opened our doors and our hearts to beautiful human beings seeking a better life. What a testament to the Great Commandment, as we partnered with area service providers, local churches, LSS, and more, to share food, shelter, and transportation. Director of Operations and Property

On December 2, 2018, the congregation approved a \$1,383,304 Budget for 2019. As is the case with church budgets, they are designed based on a full cost basis and then balanced against pledged giving, anticipated giving, and other income (facility rent, niche sales, and other faith contributions).

It was anticipated that, based on payroll savings, actual income and expenses would be well below budget as displayed in the Variance Report. Facility rental income was considerably higher due in part to a one-time rental

payment by the Town of Gilbert for a construction easement.

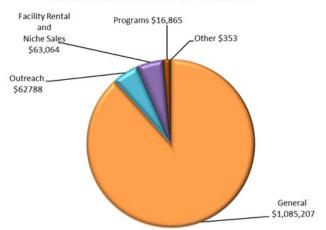
As for the other income categories of programming and outreach, those dollars are factored in as offsetting income on the expenses side. As such, the budget doesn't show their income and their expenses are usually higher than budgeted—an exception for 2019 programming demonstrates the lack of a mission trip. **NOTE: RENEW Campaign funds are not reported on the Variance Report.**

Adherence to a tight budget by the diligent staff allowed for all, and some additional, programming to be completed even with a 2% decrease in income over the previous year. Actual expenses were down 6% over the previous year due in large part to payroll savings in two pastors rather than three pastors. Note: Mid-year payroll savings of \$50,000.00 in 2018 lessened the overall impact of payroll savings in 2019.

The following pie graphs provide a better visual on the income and expenses generated and utilized in the Mission of Desert Cross Lutheran Church.

The Statement of Financial Position is reflective of the Assets and Liabilities plus Fund Principal as of December 31, 2019. The unrestricted cash of \$5,200 is a carry-over of a 2020 gift received in 2019. The restricted cash of \$110,519 is a total of 27 designated funds such as, but not limited to, tenant security deposits, land sale proceeds, bequeathed gifts, grants, and specific ministry support. The Mission Fund Account and Brokerage are current balances in accounts used for processing non-cash contributions such as stocks and certificates of deposits. Finally, the remaining cash asset of \$120,912 is that of the RENEW Campaign which concludes in May 2020. NOTE: The ending balance in the RENEW account does not visually demonstrate cash flow of gifts received nor

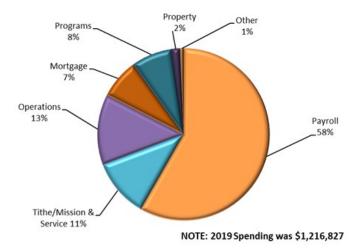
the completed projects in 2019 as noted on page 8.

With the exception of 2017, in which two anomalies occurred, contributions appear to be relatively flat at \$1,250,000. Some changes in the demographics of the Parish occurred at the end of 2018 that led to an expected decrease in giving for 2019 of approximately 2%.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Council of Desert Cross Lutheran Church

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Desert Cross Lutheran Church, Inc. (a non-profit religious corporation), which comprises the statement of financial position—modified cash basis as of December 31, 2018, and the related statements of activities—modified cash basis, functional expenses—modified cash basis, and cash flows—modified cash basis for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting as described in Note A; this includes determining that the modified cash basis of accounting is an acceptable basis for the preparation of the financial statements in the circumstances. Management is also responsible for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amount and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Desert Cross Lutheran Church, Inc. as of December 31, 2018, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting as described in Note A.

Basis of Accounting

We draw you attention to Note A of the financial statements, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial statements are prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting, which is the basis of accounting, other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our opinion is not modified with respect to this matter.

2019 was a year of many blessings for Desert Cross. We welcomed a few new people to the church staff and said a sad goodbye to another who embarked on a great new adventure called retirement, all while continuing with our commitment to our church mission of inviting others to celebrate Jesus with us and to equip others to serve in communities near and far. Interim Associate Pastor, Doris Nolan, joined us in January to assist Pastor Andrea with sermons, lectures, and visits. Pastor Doris has done an amazing job of supporting Pastor Andrea and our staff while creating strong connections with many in the congregation. Jane Yost stepped down as our Director of Worship and Music Ministry after many years of dedication and service to Desert Cross. Though excited for her, we were sad to see Jane move into her new phase of life. We have been blessed with the voice, skill, and talent of Daniel Decker as our new Worship and Music leader in Tempe.

A call committee was created in early 2019 with the focus on finding our new Associate Pastor who will not only support Pastor Andrea, but who will also lead the Gilbert site as Gilbert continues to grow and develop into their own community, while maintaining the same goals as the Tempe site.



The Tempe site's physical space continues to receive improvements with the installation of the electronic sign and with the refreshing and refurbishing of the Columbarium and the entryway into the church. New projectors and supplemental equipment

were approved, and we are awaiting the installation of the equipment which will enhance the services at both locations.

Through 2019, numerous volunteers gave generously of their time, treasures, and talents to serve those near and far through several programs such as I-HELP, the Outreach Committee, Habitat for Humanity, Hunger Jar, etc. In early 2019, a new call for service came with the Asylum Seekers program. A volunteer team created a program to assist those seeking refuge here in the United States by hosting them for 24 hours while providing food, shelter, clothing, smiles, love, and hope to many excited and scared individuals trying to legally make a safe, new life in America.

At the end of 2019, Pastor Andrea worked with Denise McClellan and Paul Fagerman to gather information to develop the vision for the future of Desert Cross through

the groundWORK 2019 program. Many small groups met to discuss our strengths and weaknesses so we can develop a plan to strengthen our future and to spread the word of God and Jesus to others in our communities. The work on this project will continue through 2020.

We are fortunate to have such a dedicated and talented group of pastors, staff, and volunteers who work hard to live out our mission. We are very blessed!

Congregational Meeting Notes

Desert Cross Lutheran Church Annual Meeting March 3, 2019

A quorum was established, and Paul Fagerman, Council President, welcomed all to the meeting.

Pastor Andrea opened the meeting with prayer.

New Business:

- 1. Annual Report with Financials Doug Bjotvedt presented the Annual Report. He reported that we received 85% of what had been pledged for contributions, and 92% of overall income that was expected. We completed 2018 with a loss of \$40,000.00. Concerns were raised over the loss and he informed us that we will be watching the budget very closely as we move forward and will be working on long term plans to help maintain the budget. There is currently \$129,000.00 in RENEW Home and \$16,350.00 in RENEW Mission. Vince Sciame moved and Don Hutson seconded that the financial report for 2018 be approved. The motion was passed unanimously. It was noted that the external audit is set to begin on March 5, 2019.
- 2. Nominating Committee Paul reviewed the Council and Chamber positions that will be open for the next term. Open positions for the next Council include Vice President and Gilbert Member at Large. There will be one open position on the Endowment Committee. There will be two open positions on the Gilbert Chamber. Paul explained the process for forming the Nominating Committee and asked for four nominations from the floor to fill the open slots. Jerry Whiting, Dale Martin, Derek Reaban, and Susan Tischaefer were nominated. Tracy

Clark moved that we elect those that were nominated. Bob Rose seconded the motion. The motion was passed unanimously. The Nominating Committee will include Don Pelley (serving as Past President), Outgoing Council member Bryan Riensche, and the four Floor Nominations.

3. **Listening Posts Review** — Stan Fernandes presented a general overview of what was learned through the recent Listening Posts. Two sessions were held in Tempe and two were held in Gilbert. The first topic discussed was the role of the new Associate Pastor. In the sessions it was presented that the new Associate Pastor would answer a call to serve Desert Cross Lutheran Church with a focus on serving and leading the Gilbert location. Pastor Andrea welcomed everyone to the meeting and opened with a verse from Psalm 108 and prayer. She shared that this meeting was to update the congregation on groundwork2019.

Paul Fagerman reviewed what has already happened this year.

- January we welcomed Pastor Doris Nolan as our Interim Associate Pastor.
- February we had listening sessions for the introduction of groundWORK 2019.
- March Stan Fernandes put together a report summarizing what we learned during the listening sessions. We also elected the Call Committee as we began our search for a new Associate Pastor.
- April/May The Call Committee sent out a congregational survey. A search committee was formed to find a new Director of Worship and Music as Jane Yost announced her retirement.
- June The Call Committee and Search Committee continued their work with finding new candidates.
- July Introduction of Daniel Decker as the new Director of Worship and Music.
- August Planning for Fall programs as well as

moving forward with groundWORK 2019.

Denise McClellan shared what changes have been made in response to the listening sessions that took place in February.

- The WETogether team sat down and looked at what the program has done over the past 5 years.
- Over the summer they sent out emails to the congregation explaining what WETogether is and why they do what they do. They also explained upcoming changes to the program.
- People wanted to connect worship and education, so there will be a key word/theme worked into both worship and education each week.
- Education will be based on the Revised Common Lectionary each week.
- Sunday School class size varied, so they are combining K-5th grade and doing VBS style stations each week.
- They heard that people wanted more opportunity for fellowship after service. At the Tempe site they have moved the location of the Adult Forum to the Community Center so that people can meet in the Fellowship Hall all morning.
- It is apparent that church attendance is dropping and there is a need to stay connected even when people can't make it to worship on a weekend. People also wanted to see an increase in our online presence. The Desert Cross Faith Formation website was formed by Denise McClellan. People can read posts at www.dclcfaithformation.org. This website kicked off on August 19, 2019 and currently has 87 following, has had 359 visitors from 8 different countries.

Pastor Andrea shared what is going to happen next - what are the next steps.

- We will use our mission statement as our guide as we move forward with in-house strategic planning. We will focus on the following words: Celebrate, Invite, Equip, and Serve.
- There will be a series of small group listening sessions that will allow us to dream and evaluate, talk and listen, and pray and plan. There will be many opportunities to attend a session, and they ask that each person only attend one session. There is a schedule of these listening sessions copies were available at the

meeting today and an email will be sent to the congregation with the schedule as well.

- Once we have a summary of what is discussed in the small group listening sessions we plan to focus on common themes and ideas. The goal is to be able to share this summary at the Congregational Meeting that will take place on December 8, 2019.
- The next steps will be to pray, evaluate, and plan.
 This will move us into the next phase—Mission and Ministry: Into the Future, where we can work on the new objectives and goals.
- We will be launching an opportunity to form prayer teams to pray over each step of this process.

1) groundWORK 2019

Pastor Andrea and Denise McClellan reviewed the groundWORK 2019 process and shared the following statistics. Small group listening sessions were held from September - November. In total there were 23 listening sessions with 187 participants. The Desert Cross Mission Statement was used as the guide for discussion focusing on Celebrate, Invite, Equip, and Serve. Common themes from each area were shared in regards to what we are

doing well and where we have the opportunity to grow.

Celebrate: Worship, Fellowship, Community Building

What we appreciate - variety of worship services, Lutheran liturgy, sermons, the hunger jar, music, children in worship, ChristCare groups, Fellowship opportunities, and the variety of groups offered.

Room for growth - increasing worship attendance, finding ways to draw people in to DCLC, creating more fellowship time on Sunday mornings.

Invite: Welcoming, Evangelism, Visitors, New Members

What we appreciate - DCLC is friendly, loving, welcoming, the Gilbert welcome packet, ushers and greeters, open communion invitation, the electronic sign at Tempe. Room for growth - increase use of social media, expand ways to follow up with visitors, work on connecting new members.

Equip: Teaching, Learning, Education, Training

What we appreciate - Children's Ministry Programming and Adult Education offerings.

Room for growth - lack of attendance and participation, need robust programming for youth.

Serve: Mission & Outreach

What we appreciate - DCLC does mission and outreach well with numerous opportunities to serve.

Room for growth - there is a thirst for more opportunities to serve, especially in the community with existing non-profit organizations.

New Steps: Mission and Ministry Into the Future. We will pray about our mission, evaluate ideas for programming and ministry that were heard during the listening sessions, and plan how to implement these ideas.

There was an opportunity for questions and discussion.

2) 2019 Financial Review

Vince Sciame gave an update for 2019.

As of 11/30/2019: total gifts \$1,050,278; total expenses \$1,113,924 with a difference of (\$63,646) between gifts and expenses for year. Expected that we will end the year with a profit of \$14,581.

3) 2020 Budget Presentation and Vote

Doug gave update on 2020. Explained projected 2020 budget. Expected budget for 2020: \$1,353,222. As of now, we have received 174 pledge cards with approximately \$697,000 pledged. Other faith contributions is \$137,814, meaning we will need this amount to have a zero balance.

It was explained that this was due to a combination of Chad Diegle going from part time to full time and an increase in budget for youth programming and evangelism.

Pending (for landscape): \$2,000.

Cash on Hand: \$115,625.23 (as of 11/30/19).

She then shared an update on replacing the audio system at Tempe. Jessica and Daniel have worked with three companies to obtain quotes for replacing the sound and video system (soundboard, microphones, monitors, speakers, relocation of the band from the back to the front of the sanctuary, and projectors). They have chosen a company they would like to work with. The quote would total \$48,000 (this includes a 5% cushion for incidentals).

There was an opportunity for questions and discussions. Tracy Clark moved and Stan Fernandes seconded to

approve the following motion:

Vote, by the Desert Cross Lutheran Church Congregation to approve entering into a contract with EAR and AZSound Pro for an amount not to exceed \$48,000 to update the audio and video system from the RENEW Home fund.

Verbal vote: Passed unanimously with no negative votes. This will leave a balance of \$70,000 in the RENEW fund for updating the sanctuary (pews, paint, flooring, etc.).

The meeting adjourned with Shannon Burns thanking everyone from staff to members for their continued support of DCLC.

- As Michael Lottes and Daniel Decker now trade off on leading the Saturday night worship, I now coordinate with Michael to upload the weekly PowerPoint slide shows and any additional slides or videos that are needed for services.
- The Safety and Security Team was also formed in the last year. As part of my worship duties it is also important to ensure as best as possible a safe environment in which to worship. This includes working with the team to assess our current needs as well as institute any changes deemed necessary that would be proactive in safety. One change we have made is locking the exterior doors 10-15 minutes after the start of the 5:00pm and 9:30am services. The ushers are also watching the parking lot and entry area during this time to open the doors for any late persons. In May we also did a series of "Safety Talks" to remind people to be aware of emergency exits in any building, where fire extinguishers and first aid kits are located, and asked them to think about how they would exit the building if needed, especially if they would need assistance.

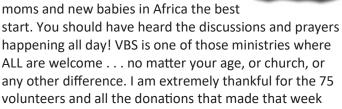


Vacation Bible School: Vacation

I truly appreciate the investment that Desert Cross has made in Health Ministry and my role as Parish Nurse. I am able to bring the love and the caring of our congregation to those who are having challenges with their health through home, care center, and hospital visits. I am able to share my experience with community resources with people, helping them find agencies and items to meet their needs.

My experience in Parish Nursing has led to some exciting national opportunities. I was elected Vice President for Health Ministry Association, the professional organization for those interested in health and faith. I am serving on a national committee helping to create a process to be used for wellness program development in a variety of congregations. I am affiliated with Chamberlain University and Brookline College as a preceptor, working with community health nursing students. Locally, I work in collaboration with Dignity Health's Center for Faith Health Partnerships to keep up with current knowledge and to mentor fellow Faith Community Nurses. I attended conferences on Child Safety, the Opioid Epidemic, Pain and Palliative Care, and Youth Mental Health First Aid.

In some of my other work at Desert Cross, I supervise the church nursery ministry. We had students graduate, which opened up opportunities for new staff to work with us on the team—Maddie Fernicchio, Joe English,

Josh Fossett, George Robinson, and Annika Beck. As a Stephen Leader with Dave Lanstrom, we commissioned new Stephen Ministers—Edie Shipton, Heidi Maxson, and Ron Diegle. Our Stephen Ministry program is about 80% linked with care receivers. I serve with Dawn Collins to shepherd the women's group. We have adapted to the preferences of the group and now hold events throughout the year including a fun bread baking class at our neighborhood Great Harvest store and an evening with a national group called Aspire Women's conference. I work with the Mothers of Pre-schoolers group led by Mandie Lottes and her team to support mothers in the season of raising young children. I am also a member of the newly formed Safety Committee, led by Andy and Jessica Robinson, where we seek to anticipate and plan for potential problems. We gave safety tips to the congregation such as being aware of exits and safe placement of walkers and wheelchairs. I love working in partnership with Children's Ministry with annual events such as "cooking with kids" and serving as the nurse for Vacation Bible School.

When writing the summary of the year, I am reminded of the blessings of working with a wonderful group of volunteers and staff. Each family at Desert Cross is precious to me, and I appreciate being able to journey to wellness along with you. I am willing to be your partner in healthcare and ministry, sharing the tears and joys of life.

In April I was nominated to be the staff representative on the Call Committee for the next Associate Pastor at Desert Cross. Because I am the staff representative, I have been the one scheduling communication with the congregation, reserving space for our meetings, and making sure that the committee has all of the paperwork needed for the interviews that we have been conducting. The Call Committee has been meeting for almost a year, and we are listening to the Holy Spirit and determined to find the best person for Desert Cross.

A member of the Boy Scout troop associated with Desert Cross put up new sign frames as part of his Eagle Scout project. The frames blew over, and a group of dedicated members constructed new frames and were able to use the bases to get a sign frame up just before Easter, and I was able to get the Easter banner hung. With the ability to hang banners again, I designed a Fall Festival banner and a Christmas banner this year. We also hung an existing Advent banner. I am grateful for the team of men in Gilbert that get the banners up and take them down.



This last spring the Stewardship team started planning the Ministry Fair, which was held on August 25, 2019. I was responsible for the publicity for this event and helped with the printing of material. Dawn also helped with this, and it was very much appreciated. In July, I finalized the Desert Cross Stewardship Brochure. It is an informational pamphlet that the Stewardship team has been talking about for a few years and made it a goal to accomplish in 2019. While I was the one behind the visual elements, it was definitely a collaboration of the entire team.

Next up for me was the Fall Festival. I helped with a lot of the visual elements of this event. I created emails to advertise it. flyer handouts, and a street banner. I also worked as a liaison between the volunteer that took the lead on this event and the church with logistics.

This fall I was once again part of the team that put together the Fall Stewardship campaign. Deciding the logo was simple because we wanted to support the vision planning that Pastor Andrea presented back in February (at the listening posts) of groundWORK 2019. We adapted our campaign some and called it groundWORK: Digging Deeper in Faith, but we used the same orange brick wall



as our graphic. I came up with several designs for the material that we were planning to use to share giving unit information and ran every decision by the Stewardship team.

In addition to these projects, I have designed handouts and/or bulletin inserts for Outreach Ministry drives, the Gilbert Finance and Stewardship team, and the worship planning team. There have also been seasonal bulletin inserts and quarterly financial update inserts.

On a weekly basis, I published the printed bulletin, the e-newsletter, and the 8am Order of Worship aid, designed the announcement slides, corresponded by emails with congregation members and staff, and uploaded bulletins to the Desert Cross website. In addition to this, on a monthly basis, I published the monthly printed newsletter, uploaded the Taking Faith Home devotionals (through November), maintained the calendar on the website, attended Stewardship meetings, did several Facebook posts, and put together my council report. I've continued to send out memorial announcements as well as other more creative correspondence through Constant Contact.

Gilbert Campus Chamber Reports

Finance and Stewardship

Our focus as the Gilbert Campus Finance and Stewardship Team has been to promote FAITH IN ACTION with encouraging our membership to "BECOME INVOLVED." The emphasis is to communicate and encourage the DCLC and Gilbert Campus Ministries. Our DCLC Stewardship Campaign this past fall was "groundwork: Digging Deeper in Faith." The focus has been on presentations of information through Mission Moments, bulletin inserts/ communications, and our newsletters. Our fall presentations of Deep Faith, Deep Joy, and Deep Walk encouraged our growth at Desert Cross with additional participating pledges approximating fifty additional units. Our focus as we journey into 2020 will center upon FAITH IN ACTION along with Children's Connections and Involvement. We will continue with a Total Church—DCLC Ministry Fair proposed for early October 2020. With our focus on FAITH IN ACTION, we also are responsible for communication and encouragement relating to Financial Metrics. Summarized below are various aspects of Financial Metrics.

-Our F/S Team focuses upon the GAP CHART to identify the Progress of our Stewardship giving along with the Campus Expense evaluation and Control. Our objective for the Gilbert Campus is to attain financial viability. Financial Viability is Membership giving/offering balancing our cost of operating the Gilbert Campus. The GAP CHART measures our progress to achieve the balance. We are starting year three of the program. We believe our measurement evaluation of cost is representative. Our giving/offering has grown the past two years but is not achieving the growth objective established. The GAP CHART has established Giving Growth of +8% annually. The established Cost Growth is +3% annually.

-The Gilbert Campus Offering for 2019 was \$192,014.22.

The 2018 Offering was \$189,065.92. The Giving Growth is 2019 was +\$2,948.30 or +1.56%. The Gilbert Campus is represented by 84 Giving Units.

- -The Gilbert Campus Expenses for 2019 represented \$279,571.32 and compared to 2018 Expenses of \$269,106.08. The Expense Growth was +3.89%.
- -The GAP between Gilbert Campus Expenses and Revenues represent (\$37,773.52). The Gap in 2018 was (\$47,575.66). Our GAP has narrowed.
- -The Gilbert Campus average Sunday attendance through December 29, 2019 (year of 2019) was 122. The comparable average attendance for 2018 was 129. The decline in average attendance represents 5.37%
- -The Finance and Stewardship Team for the Gilbert Campus is represented by Deb Gabrielson, Maegan Jennett, Sharon Lewis, Jim Moore, and Glenn Tischaefer. John Hughes is the Team Chamber representative.

Worship

Christmas time brought in the Angel Tree donations for Concordia Charter School Children. Tempe Community Outreach Ministry

Our Community Outreach Ministry provides many different opportunities to help those in need in our local communities. Our strength is in gathering goods. We have found organizations in our area that have established distribution systems, and we provide the items they need for their clients. We have a large bin in the Narthex for our collections. It is often overflowing with our donations. Here are some of those we are helping.

We schedule 3 or 4 blood drives a year, and we always exceed our goals.

The Souper Bowl Drive brought in 362 pounds of food. Cash was collected to vote for your favorite team; Rams \$315.43, Patriots \$96.36, and Other \$44.82 for a combined total with Gilbert's collection of \$856.81 given to Kyrene Resource Center.

In February we had Special Hunger Jar collections for Kyrene Resource Center for much needed children's

underwear. Kyrene Resource Center services the area that includes Guadalupe.

In March we supported the Baby Safe Sleep program, a State Program, which provides new parents with classes on how to take care of their newborns with the emphasis on keeping them safe. We gathered 54 onesies and outfits size 3 months to 12 months, 44 knitted caps from Pam King's knitting group, many items from the wish list that we provide, and boxes of diapers.

In April we have a used purse drive through Shoebox Ministries for women in shelters. Last year we gathered 157 purses (32 to Kyrene Resource Center), 60 clutches and make up bags, 95 pounds of personal items, and 10 pounds of jewelry.

In May and June we have our Back to School Drive. We made contact with Gathering Humanity regarding the purchase of inexpensive backpacks. We received over \$600 in the Special Hunger Jar and were able to purchase 175 backpacks for the Kyrene Resource Center. We did not have as many school supplies, but our generous congregation was able to support both this drive and the Asylum Seekers program, which came in as an emergency at the same time.

Our ongoing shoes drive brought in over 300 pairs including many new pairs donated by Foot Solutions.

In the fall, blanket and jackets filled the bin 4 times. These went to the homeless at Paz de Cristo and the Kyrene Resource Center

The Be Thankful Food Drive in November filled the bin twice with 1,210 pounds of food. Turkey Sunday brought in 39 turkeys and all were distributed by Kyrene Resource Center.

With our Angel Tree we served 22 families with 110 children. The families were interviewed by the Resource Center to verify eligibility. Each child got two gifts, one piece of clothing and one wished for gift. Thanksgiving was late this year so we put the tree up November 9th, and our sorting and packing took place on December 15th. Our new starting time was 10:30am, which worked out well. Our very efficient crew was done in about 45 minutes. Another change was placing the gifts by the family number put on the floor instead of on the tables, which was much more efficient. Only two gifts came in late this year.

Thanks to everyone who participated. The Lord said whatever we do for others we are doing for Him. These are opportunities for doing His Work.

Memorial Garden/Columbarium

The Memorial Garden/Columbarium at Desert Cross Lutheran Church was completed in November 2009 and is available for members and associated family members. Provision was also made for inurement because of a serious financial need.

One niche was purchased in 2019, making a total of 61 niches purchased. One internment took place during the year. Again, some purchasers have elected to withhold the engraving of their niche at this time.

Maintenance of the fountain was completed in October and is performed on an annual basis and/or as needed. The water cascading over the edge of the fountain forms a cross.

The cost of a niche remains at \$1,950.00, which includes two urns and engraving of two names and four dates. Maintenance and repairs are a part of the niche cost. The donation amount is \$1,000.00 of that \$1,950.00.

As part of the RENEW Campaign, an enhancement of the Memorial Garden was completed in 2019. This enhancement included artificial turf and an extension of the pavers from the parking lot to the Narthex entrance.

You are encouraged to consider purchasing a niche as you contemplate the end of life planning. The placing of an urn at the completion of a Celebration of Life service is a special time for the family and friends. You are also encouraged to take the time to sit and meditate and pray from time to time.
